

ADVENT 2025

The Great O Antiphons are a series of short verses which count down the days to Christmas Eve. Traditionally sung at the beginning and end of the Magnificat during Evensong, each antiphon begins with a different name for Jesus, best known from the verses from 'O come, O come Emmanuel….'. They draw on Scripture to help us learn about who Jesus will be, as foretold by the prophets. These will form the basis of much of our reflecting this Advent.

This beautifully illustrated, full-colour daily Advent companion explores the ancient biblical names and images for the coming Messiah familiar to most people from the hymn, 'O come, O come Emmanuel'. Well-known writers offer a total of twenty-four reflections, one for each weekday of the four weeks of Advent. The writers each offer three reflections on one of the seven antiphons: O Wisdom, O Adonai,

O Root of Jesse, O Key of David, O Morning Star, O King of the Nations, O Emmanuel. Lastly, there are three reflections on the Magnificat – Mary's Song – which the antiphons have been heard alongside since at least the eighth century. Each day includes the text of the antiphon from Common Worship, a Scripture reading exploring its biblical roots, paintings of the antiphon as a focus for meditation, a reflection, a challenge to ponder and an Advent prayer. Contributors include Jane Williams, Chris Russell, Esther Prior, Philip North, Muthuraj Swamy, Tanya Marlow, David Hoyle and Lucy Winket.





GOD MEETS US WHERE WE ARE. (MISSIONAL MUSINGS 2).

As we enter Advent the turning of the seasons draws us in once again to the great theme of waiting, that most human of all experiences. A lot has been made of the fact that Scotland have waited a long thirty years for another World Cup entry with one commentator even saying that the heartbreak and disappointments of these three decades were worth it for the joy at Hampden on Tuesday night. In the cold light of day I'm not so sure whether we are able to make trade off's like that but I know what he is trying to express.

Waiting implies that something is yet to happen and until it happens there will be a sense of things not being quite right, not quite complete, not yet fulfilled. And of course as we go through the Hebrew Scriptures and read those famous passages of longing and waiting during Advent we are taken on a journey that culminates in the joy of Christmas morning.

However, we're not there yet, so how do we live with our faith in the realities of the circumstances of our personal lives, our families, our congregations and communities...how do we wait well???

This week I have read two very different pieces which said the same thing word for word, except for one notable change. In an interview in the FT Weekend the recently retired head of MI6 is quoted as saying towards the end that 'a good spy is someone who accepts reality for what it is'. Just two days prior to that I had read in a commentary on the Prologue to the Rule of St. Benedict, that 'a good monk is someone who accepts reality for what it is'. Quite a remarkable coincidence!

Accepting reality for what it is does not mean that we submit to it or give in to it or think it cannot be changed or even stop praying for change to come. However, until change can come we really need to take stock of where we are and to pay attention to what is happening in this present moment. Human life is such that literally the only place that God can meet us actually in this very day with whatever internal and external weather systems we find ourselves in the middle of.

The great Advent question is where is God today, how is he coming to my life, my family, my congregation, my community? We need to start paying more attention and looking in unlikely places and even amongst unlikely people, to spot the often surprising ways that God meets us in this present moment. Change starts to happen from where we actually are, not where we want to be or think we should be.

A good question to ask is 'What possibilities are there of God here...what stories, homes, conversations is God showing us we need to dwell within? Often this can be through coming to terms with our own vulnerabilities and needs as it is within what we lack that we find our need of other people and of God. While we remain relatively self sufficient we can be closed off to God and others, but our needs (however uncomfortable and reluctant we are to face them) can be an invitation to others and God to enter our lives.

God meets us wherever we are this Advent and not just on Christmas morning so let us embrace and pay attention to this very present moment we find ourselves in, to look around at the communities our congregations are set within and curiously and hopefully start to explore what God could be up to and what he might ask us to join in and who we can partner with in our local areas.
