Hi.....I'm Mel, and through a circuitous route of living both in Lowestoft and Norwich, have found myself in Oban for nearly 20 years – a journey which spans the east to west of the UK. Our children were born in Norwich and I started a pilgrimage from Norwich Cathedral to Santiagode Compostella 30 years ago – so the time is right for another journey! So here I go again- 581 miles (ish) but I won't be carrying part of the organ back with me! Don't worry – I will be on the train resting my legs! Although my journey in Episcopalism is a bit different, I'm a non-realist in the tradition of Don Cupitt, I celebrate in the Christian tradition and liturgy - of which music is such a significant part. I am also journeying in the month of October for the National Autistic Society as part of their 100 miles in October. This is close to our hearts since we have lived through the brokenness and carnage after the suicide of our beautiful 19 year old son, Sasha, from undiagnosed autism. We are part of the suicide community in Scotland, making connections and advocating for diagnosis and support, meeting the challenge that the highest cause of death for people with autism and no intellectual disabilities, is suicide. There is plenty of time and space to give to both causes.

THE 2025 SEI LECTURE: 'SCOTTISH THEOLOGY & SCOT-LAND' THU 30 OCTOBER 2025 @ 5PM Dr Dafydd Mills Daniel, Lecturer in Divinity, School of Divinity, St Andrew's University, will offer the Tenth Annual Scottish Episcopal Institute Lecture on Thursday 30 October at 5pm via Zoom, entitled, 'Scottish Theology and Scot-Land'.

The majority of private land in Scotland is owned by just a few hundred wealthy individuals and international corporations. It was in response to the concentrated ownership of Scot-land that the Scottish Land Commission was established in 2017. This lecture will argue that it is possible to trace the language used in recent Scottish Land Commission policy documents to two competing theological discourses within the Scottish Enlightenment, in line with fact that the Scottish Enlightenment was not, as is often supposed, an era of secular philosophy verses Calvinist theology, but in fact a competition between two opposing parties within the Kirk: Moderates and Orthodox. Looking at contemporary political discussions through the lens of Scottish Enlightenment theological controversies, not only changes our impression of the Scottish Enlightenment, but raises the question of whether the central question for contemporary debates is not who owns Scot-land but how it is used?

PROVINCIAL STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT - WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE SEC?

The impressive city centre offices of the Diocese of Glasgow & Galloway provided the venue for the September meeting of the Provincial Standing Committee, where members were given a warm welcome by Bishop Nicholas Bundock and his team. Before the formal business of the meeting began, committee members took part in an exercise on good governance, focused on the General Synod of the SEC's Constitution, comprised of the Code of Canons and the Digest of Resolutions. Individual contributions opened up discussion over the strengths and weaknesses of provincial governing structures.

This proved to be a useful focussing tool as the committee went on to consider a draft of the Provincial Strategy 2026-2033, provided by the Secretary General, Dr Dee Bird. The strategy is under development in consultation with the Standing Committee, College of Bishops, General Synod and vestries from across Scotland with the purpose of allocating resources appropriately to empower, support and enable the Church at diocesan and charge levels. The committee discussed a draft strategic vision statement and five broad categories of strategic priorities. Further work on the strategy will now take place as part of its development process.

The Secretary General also briefed Standing Committee on **options for the hosting of next year's General Synod meeting, including a proposal to hold the meeting outside Edinburgh**.

The Chief Operating Officer, Dr Patricia Krus, provided a series of **updates detailing revisions of General Synod policies and practices**, including health & safety, HR policies, staffing structure and a GDPR review of the Red Book. There was also an **update on the move out of Forbes House** to alternative accommodation in Edinburgh because of on-going issues with the existing building. An opportunity for relocation had been identified and negotiations were underway to progress interest in securing a lease.

Paul Williams, Net Zero Delivery Director, was invited to give a presentation on **revisions to the Active Travel section of the Net Zero Action Plan**, which include the introduction of a Sustainable Travel Grant to support charges who wish to encourage and enable more sustainable travel choices, thereby reducing the impact of work-related travel by everyone who travels on behalf of the Scottish Episcopal Church. Standing Committee approved the updated section and the administration of the accompanying grant.

The committee approved the recruitment of a full-time researcher on a 12-month contract to support the work of the Legacy of Slavery Working Group. The appointee will be responsible for conducting archival research to locate, assess and map historical materials relating to the Scottish Episcopal Church that demonstrate ties of the Church to transatlantic slavery.

Also **approved were proposals for Mission & Ministry Support Grant** funding from the dioceses of Aberdeen & Orkney, Glasgow & Galloway and Brechin.

The meeting closed with a sense of positive progress having been made on several fronts, and the committee will convene again in November for its final meeting of 2025.

MISSION BOARD REPORT

The Mission Board held a hybrid meeting during September based at the Diocesan Centre in Glasgow, with several colleagues joining online, writes the Rev Keith Thomasson, Convener of the Misssion Board. The meeting was rooted in prayer and the study of scripture.

As the representative of the College of Bishops, the Rt Rev Dr Nick Bundock, Bishop of Glasgow & Galloway, spoke of his previous experience in mission in Manchester, and the opportunities that are emerging in the diocese and province. One key aspect is the importance to identify what is a barrier to mission and to carefully remove it. There was a discussion of the role of the Mission Board within the General Synod Office and Province. The Digest of Resolutions 2024 states that: 'The Mission Board shall have responsibility for the strategic oversight of the mission of the Church within Scotland, the United Kingdom and abroad'. In light of this the Mission Board seeks to develop a greater synergy with the Standing Committee and College of Bishops. It was a delight to receive an initial draft of the emerging Provincial Strategy and to contribute ideas and affirm the direction of travel. Mission Board wondered how we might actively contribute to the resourcing and delivery of the strategy.

Reports were given from the dioceses and the pendant committees of the Mission Board, namely Church in Society, Global Partnerships, and Youth. An example of the excellent work being done is that of Cletus who receives a scholarship from the Global Partnerships Committee for his doctoral studies in church leadership at Napier University. Cletus was part of the teaching staff for the SEI orientation week held recently in Perth.

Mission Board will be releasing additional funds for one-off missional projects within the dioceses. Please watch for your diocesan communications on this matter.
